




St Oswald's Church – who are we?

We are part of the Church of England in the St. Alban's Diocese.



You will find us at Malvern Way, Croxley Green, WD3 3QL, just off Baldwins Lane.

There is a direct footpath link from Baldwins Lane into the rear of the church grounds, and car park access from Malvern Way.

The office entrance is at the back of the church hall.





By now most of you will be aware that I will be leaving St Oswald's and Croxley Green after Easter to take up the post of part-time Associate Minister, with house for duty, at Great St Mary's Church in Sawbridgeworth. In my final letter, I shall be reflecting a little more on this change of life. You may also be aware that Bishop Alan has announced his retiring as

Diocesan Bishop a month later, at the end of May. My seventeen years at St Oswald's just beats Bishop Alan's sixteen at St Albans! Seriously, I am grateful to Bishop Alan for the positive and supportive ethos he has worked hard to maintain within this diocese and his encouragement in "Living God's Love".

Spiritual Renewal

Bishop Alan's last major initiative within the diocese has been to designate 2025 as a Year of Spiritual Renewal and Wellbeing, a year-long journey designed to help us lift our hearts and minds, inspired by the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. This initiative is particularly appropriate in the wake of the challenges we have faced over recent years, as individuals, in society and in the Church of England. The intention is to guide us in reconnecting with our faith and seeking the renewing life of the Holy Spirit. To further that aim, a programme of quiet days, week-long "retreats in daily

life", day pilgrimages (including a John Bunyan Trail) and School of Theology talks and lectures has been planned. Details can be found, and will be regularly updated with new events, at the website https://year.stalbansdiocese.org. In addition to the diocesan programme (which, incidentally has been financed by various grant-making bodies, with no funding drawn from parish share), it is hoped that local events and opportunities will be initiated in parishes and deaneries.

Lent Course

Croxley Green is always ahead of the game (!) and so I'm pleased to announce that the Churches Together Lent Course this year is



very much directed towards spiritual renewal. At the suggestion of Steve Elmes from the Baptist Church, the course is to be based on Richard Foster's book Streams of Living Water. In what has been described as a "landmark work", Foster examines six dimensions of faith and practice which have

characterised the Christian tradition down through the centuries, each one as important and relevant today as in the past.

Starting on the day after Ash Wednesday and continuing on Thursdays throughout Lent at 2pm, with a 7.30pm repeat, each session will focus on one of these six "streams" with a snapshot summary and a practical exercise.

The programme is as follows:

6th March: The Contemplative Tradition: Discovering the Prayer-Filled Life (at All Saints' Church)

13th March: The Holiness Tradition: Discovering the Virtuous Life (at Croxley Methodist Church)

20th March: The Charismatic Tradition: Discovering the Spirit-Empowered Life (at Croxley Baptist Church)

27th March: The Social Justice Tradition: Discovering the Compassionate Life (Venue tba)



3rd April: The Evangelical Tradition: Discovering the Word-Centered Life (2pm at St Oswald's Church; 7.30pm venue tba)

10th April: The Incarnational Tradition: Discovering the Sacramental Life (at St Bede's RC Church)

These meetings are open to anyone and everyone. The previous Lent courses have been much appreciated. Please put the dates in your diary.

Lent Reading

Deepening our faith is one of the objectives that will govern our new Mission Action Plan. Lent is traditionally a time to focus on that aim and spiritual reading is one way for us as individuals to do so. Each year, I customarily suggest some books for Lent reading which I hope that some will find profitable, so here are my recommendations for 2025. Of course, there are plenty of other possibilities which you may want to explore.

Richard Foster's Streams of Living Water, mentioned above, is quite a substantial volume and might take longer than Lent to read but that's not necessarily a bad thing! It would be a helpful way of supplementing the Churches Together course. Although its length

may appear forbidding, it's not a highly academic work and much of it is taken up with lively storytelling about the lives of some significant figures in the different traditions and practical lessons are drawn at the end of each section. The section at the back which gives potted biographies of many more individuals, is perhaps more for dipping into than reading straight through. I have enjoyed and benefitted from this book and can thoroughly recommend it to anyone up for a challenge.

The Bible Reading Fellowship Lent book for 2025 is **Jo Swinney's The Whole Easter Story**. This follows the traditional pattern of providing each day (with Sunday as a "rest day") a Bible passage (given in full), some thoughts on the passage, a suggestion for further reflection and a short prayer. This format is tried and tested and each day's offering is easily manageable and supplemented by a relevant line drawing. The Whole Easter Story should appeal especially to anyone with an interest in Eco-Church as Jo Swinney is Director of Communications for A Rocha International and the book seeks to explain "why the cross is good news for creation."



The BRF Lent books are usually very good and this one promises to be no exception. Who knows, but using The Whole Easter Story during Lent may inspire you to start using the regular BRF daily Bible notes available from Brita Blackwell!

For anyone for whom a daily reading is a little too much, **Paula Gooder's Women of Holy Week** might be the answer. There are nine sections, so you could read one each week

during Lent and carry on into the Easter season. I have recommended Paula Gooder's books before. She is a lively, well-informed, grounded communicator, as anyone who attended her Deanery talk last year can attest. Over the course of nine stories, Paula Gooder imagines what it might have been like to

accompany Jesus in the final week of his life from the perspective of nine different women, some named in the Gospel accounts, others fictional but based on deep background knowledge. At the back of the book, each story is provided with the relevant Bible references, questions to ponder and some explanatory material and this short book is illustrated with attractive and thoughtful paintings by Ally Barrett.

The name **Richard Harries** will be familiar to listeners to the Radio 4 Today programme through his contributions to Thought for the Day. Previously Bishop of Oxford, he has written a number of books which sensitively explore the Christian faith for both believers and would-be believers, especially as it relates to contemporary questions and culture. His **Seeing God in Art** considers the different ways in which 30 works of art, some well known, others less so, Illuminate vital facets of the faith. The sections are not too lengthy and, as one would expect, the book is splendidly illustrated. I used some of Bishop Richard's material in a recent sermon featuring Piero della Francesca's Baptism of Christ and look forward to reading more in due course.

Each year I like to include a choice for those who feel that "spiritual reading" is not for them but which nevertheless might provoke reflection on what it means to be a Christian in today's world. This year I am suggesting **Politics**, **Poverty and Belief**, written shortly before his death last year by **Frank Field**, former Labour MP for Birkenhead. Lest I be accused of political partisanship, I note that Field, who was always regarded as something of a maverick MP, was cold shouldered out of the Young Conservatives as a schoolboy and resigned the Labour whip before dismissal from the party, losing his seat in the 2019 General Election. Field was inspired by his Christian faith and by a desire to find practical solutions to serious problems such as poverty, hunger, modern

slavery and climate change. In this memoir he sets out what he aspired to achieve and the thinking behind it. Whether you agree or disagree with him, the book provides much food for thought – and maybe stimulus to action too.

Finally comes "something completely different", **Psalms**, a stained glass colouring book from Dover publishing, created by **Jessica Mazurkiewicz**, comprising 16



translucent pages, each featuring a verse from one of the Psalms. Taking time to carefully colour in these designs could function as a meditative exercise, calming the soul whilst absorbing the scriptural quotation. This is an activity that could be shared with others, especially any children in your circle. And on completion you can display the resulting artwork in a window!

Samples of all these books will be on display in Church for inspection during the first couple of weeks in February and orders can be taken. Or you can order yourself from Eden, Aslan, Waterstones or, if you must, Amazon.

First of all may I start by wishing everyone a very happy, healthy and peaceful new year.

For this meeting we had a small number of members attending. Unfortunately some are suffering with the cold, cough and chest infections and a number do not come out when it is so cold, even though the sun was shining.

Amber Dalton from the charity Communities 1st came along to tell us about the Three Rivers Shopper Bus and the Watford and Three Rivers Day Trippers.



Working with you to make a bigger difference

The Shopper Bus is an accessible door to door service that runs on weekdays to supermarkets. A return fare can be booked for £6 and that just covers the petrol. The rest of the expenses are covered by the Councils and charity funds. If you book four block bookings there is a 20% discount. The Drivers will help carry shopping into your home and help you with getting on and off the bus. Taster sessions are offered to see if the service works for you.

The Day Tripper Service is offered by Watford and Three Rivers Councils. Each month there is a day trip organised of about four to five hours and costs £6 for the trip, to a wide variety of destinations (entrance fees and refreshments are not included in the £6). As examples the January trips included Hertford Castle and Springtime Nursery Enfield.

It was a lovely afternoon, with lots of questions for Amber. They are always open to suggestions for Day Trips. Both these services are useful if you do not drive or only drive short distances. The drivers are friendly and helpful and if the service is used regularly become friends and so do the customers on the bus.

A CROXLEY RAMBLER'S DIARY

Brian Thomson walks to Stocker's Lake - 21st January 2025

It was cold and Croxley Danes school playing field was shrouded in mist. Singly and in groups young

people were making their way to the bottom of Baldwins Lane - some striding purposefully, some ambling and chatting. Traffic queued as parents drove their children into the school and then attempted to rejoin the flow. Under the railway bridge on the litter-strewn pavement I could only see across the road. The new West Watford skyscraper was hidden by the fog. It was good to leave the busy traffic as I made my way onto the canal towpath at Cassiobridge.

Through the mist I noted smart barges, including the 'Baltic Icebreaker', at the wharf beneath rusty old railway bridge. You encounter a wide variety of vessels along the towpath; from traditional barges to motor cruisers and even a converted life raft. Some are well cared for and some have seen better days. Hardly anyone was about. Sensible people were keeping warm inside.

But I noticed some signs of approaching spring including hazel catkins full of pollen and a group of mallards in fine breeding plumage. Beyond Mill lock young birches and



sycamores have colonised the slope from the old London Transport dump but there is one splendid oak tree beside the towpath as a reminder of the landscape before the underground railway.

Cyclists approaching from behind can be a bit of a hazard for walkers

on the narrow towpath. Some seem to expect you to have a sixth sense and leap out of the way as they rush along without warning. So it was nice to meet a polite young woman who used her bell and then wished me good walking as she rode by. After Lot Mead lock I was startled by an aggressive greylag goose landing on the water close by. Fortunately, its noisy approach was aimed at a nearby Canada goose rather than me.

There are some fine floating homes moored on the approach to Batchworth. A number have created gardens on the banks. One home was under construction on a large pontoon. I particularly admired a Dutch sailing vessel and a colourful plot beside the towpath set out as if for tea on the lawn. Another remarkable boat incorporates



a VW Touran into its DIY design and boasts large solar panels.

The Rickmansworth Waterways shop was open but I didn't stop, instead walking on beside Batchworth lake into the Aquadrome. For a cold gloomy day there were plenty of people about exercising themselves and, of course, their dogs. My goal was Stocker's lake so I continued on, hoping that the mist would lift as a weak sun tried to

break through. I stopped at several of the hides and noted the usual birds - Canada geese, coots, grebes, ducks and noisy black-headed gulls. But it was hard to see more than a hundred yards. One keen photographer had spotted a kingfisher but could not get a decent photo in the mist. However, mist does





create some remarkable visual effects starkly black winter trees against a white background and reflections of the pale sun in still waters. I walked round on the narrow bank between the lake and the Colne, passing a small herd of brown cattle, back into the Aquadrome. It was time for coffee in the busy café.

I had planned my homeward route through Rickmansworth High Street so set off beside Batchworth Lake only to find that the pedestrian bridge over the Colne was closed. I had heard something about the Council replacing the bridge but hadn't put two and two

together. I toyed with the idea of climbing the barrier - a bit tricky and undignified - and I didn't fancy wading the river. So there was nothing for it but a lengthy detour back to the point where the Colne leaves the canal and where it is joined by the Chess. I took the little bridge over

the Chess to Riverside
Drive and found the
footpath to St Mary's
beside the arm of the
canal leading to the Bury.
Snowdrops were out in
the churchyard as I made
my way into town.

Someone had been busy decorating the wall of Boots with colourful heart stencils on Solomons Hill. It cheers up the place on a grey day. Climbing the slope

beside Waitrose I noticed that a street light had been installed, powered by its own wind turbine and solar panel. It would be a bit dim on days



the sunshine and, at my approach, a little egret flew up from the stream into the trees. There was plenty of water moving swiftly in the Chess and, although the gravel bottom was clearly visible, it looked cloudy. I crossed the footbridge and ascended the hill on the Croxley Boundary footpath. The path skirts a spinney where I noticed new leaves on an elder tree - the first I have seen this year. From the top there is a pleasant view across the valley to trees beyond. couldn't help thinking that we are fortunate to live in this pleasant place.

The Parish Council balustrade

like this. Over the bridge in Ricky park I greeted an old friend, an ancient sweet chestnut. Someone had added graffiti here too - not so artistic. The day was looking up as I crossed the park and I was joined by my shadow.

There are a number of fine trees on the path around the cricket ground which leads to the Chess Valley footpath. The river banks are shored up with sandbags in a number of places and I noticed that there is a sizeable pond in the field between the river and Copthorne Road. Gulls were enjoying

helped my climb up steps onto the Green. Building work continues on the new estate at Killingdown. Wherever did the developers get the moniker 'Millside Grange'? There has never been a mill at Killingdown! I walked through the completed part of the estate and was glad to note that they have found road names with local associations including a reference to the Woolrych family. The land beyond Little Green Lane has also been transformed by a large drainage pit and pools on the field beyond. As I walked along the lane I noticed more signs of approaching spring - new growth of cow parsley and wild arum and lunchtime children's voices carried through the still air from Little Green school.

our challenge

To cultivate what St Paul calls the **grace of giving (2 Cor 8:7)** we need to think carefully about all we receive from God and prayerfully review our giving.

Our church needs £2,150 per week in 2025 (£135 more than last year) to sustain our building and clergy, our **ministry and mission**. To enable our ministry to grow & flourish we need the **grace of giving**.

our vision

is to be a joyful, prayerful, caring and growing Church; alive to the Holy Spirit; welcoming and accessible to all; building relationships with God and the community we serve

In the coming year we need to raise £15,000 more than last year to increase our outreach and to build up our reserves to fund essential works such as updating and improving the Hall kitchen. The total funds required each year to cover the Ministry and Church and Hall running costs are £114,000.

To fulfil this vision, each week we expect to spend:

£1,350 on our share of clergy costs: stipend, housing, training £430 on our building: insurance, heat, light etc £350 on worship and ministry: for our congregation and wider community, including our hall

Well over half of our income comes from congregational giving. About a quarter is from rentals of the hall. The balance comes from HMRC for Gift Aided giving (about 13%) and various fund-raising activities (about 6%).

Thank you for making this happen.

Council update January 2025

Over the past six months the PCC has overseen some important changes in the church. We are

very grateful for a donation which has enabled the church to enjoy the sound of a new organ that has enhanced our musical life. The work on the church kitchen has been completed with thanks to Guy Parks for his careful oversight in bringing this to fruition. The result is a better facility for Cafe O's service to the community and it means that refreshments can be served more easily after church services.

There have been changes to St Oswald's 10% Giving Scheme. The charity ASCEND, formerly an outreach from All Saints' South Oxhey, has become a project of the Watford and Three Rivers Trust. The PCC agreed that the funds previously set aside for ASCEND in 2024 should be used to support the Croxley Green Parish Nurse. The Parish Nurse will be supported again in 2025 together with the Trinity Project for children's mental wellbeing once it gains charitable status. The full list of charities supported by the scheme in 2025 is USPG, CMS, Christian Solidarity Worldwide, Church Army Marylebone Project, Alternatives Trust East London, Watford Schools Trust, A Rocha, Croxley Parish Nurse and the Trinity Project.

At its December meeting the PCC considered St Oswald's reaction to the Prayers of Love and Faith from the Archbishops' Council concerning the blessing of same sex relationships.

The PCC agreed as follows: "This PCC supports the use of the Prayers of Love and Faith in appropriate circumstances within a regular church service as described in the pastoral guidance."

In December the PCC also decided that the Parish Project for 2025 should be fund-raising to improve the kitchen facilities in the church hall.



In January the PCC noted the progress made with safeguarding procedures, with gratitude to Val Edwards. The church has completed the level 2 action plan and will continue with the level 3 plan in the coming months.





Richard Doughty brings us the latest on the Trinity Project

We at St Oswald's and at other deanery churches are now more than a term into

the project's second year, helping young people build up mental wellbeing, and particularly supporting new year 7 children coping with the huge change of moving up to big school.

Founded to help young people develop mental wellbeing and resilience to all that life throws at them, the project relies greatly on prayer and God's guidance to help young people live life to the full and navigate the all too regular and sometimes graphic ups and downs of growing up.

The response has continued to be amazing. When we started in September 2023, St Oswald's enthusiastic band of volunteer helpers hosted around 30 children for the first Friday of Donut Club. Currently average attendance is running at around



40. Donut Club has so far attracted around 100 individuals this academic year - and new faces keep appearing.

The young people are keen to meet up with their old friends from primary school, have a chat, eat doughnuts and play a variety of games: table tennis, snooker, pool, table football, 3D noughts and crosses, all laid out inside St Oswald's church. They also try their hand with kinetic modelling sand, card and puzzle games.

This is a youth club-style meet-up in the church which is designed

to support them as they get used to the challenges of secondary school including up to 2000 other students, new academic demands, confusing timetables, unknown teachers and classmates.

Last year's Donut club members were keen to continue meeting. So we've set up a monthly Hotdog club for year 8s, run on similar lines - yes, sausages replace doughnuts. Year 8s are into their music and the



hope is to incorporate some line dancing and singing. We had an impromptu performance just last month!

Across the deanery, Trinity Project activities are being warmly welcomed by students, families and teachers – and increasing. We are now partnering with four secondary schools and six primary schools. Among the initiatives and events planned for 2025 are a weekly mental wellbeing course with Get Set 4 Tennis (a tennis coaching group) at Joan of Arc School; wellbeing 'Wonderland break' times at St Peter's primary school, Croxley Danes and Reach Free School; Donut Clubs in two local churches, drop-in café sessions at St Peter's church, Mill End, 1:1 support for students in two primary schools; and a Wednesday Lunchtime focus for Reach Free School's year 7s.

The Trinity Project is close to gaining charitable status and will then be able to invest in new initiatives. We hold regular speaker and prayer meetings each term to publicise project activities and the urgent need for more prayer and other support for its work among young people. Retirement letter from Bishop Alan

7th January 2025

It has been the privilege of my life to serve as the Bishop of St Albans. However, next month I will be 68 and the time has come for me to lay down my responsibilities and to hand the baton of leadership on to whomever the Lord calls to succeed me. I am writing, therefore, to tell you that, with the support and permission of His Majesty the King, I will be retiring as Diocesan Bishop on 31 May 2025.

The past sixteen years have been full of challenges, opportunities and surprises. With God's help, I have encouraged us to 'Live God's Love' among the people of Herts, Beds and Luton and parts of Barnet, and to do so with generosity and joy, with imagination and courage. In that endeavour, I have been grateful for my colleagues on the senior staff and for the support of so many clergy and lay people across the Diocese. I never cease to give thanks to God for the warmth of your friendship. You have enriched my life and ministry in countless ways.

I plan to retire to Wiltshire, the county in which I was born and brought up, and where most of my extended family continue to live.

There will be plenty of opportunities to say our farewells in the Spring. In the meantime, I have many things I still want to do in my remaining months in office as I seek to serve God and prepare for the next phase of my life and ministry.







Suguru Puzzle

The grid is filled with smaller tiles of between 1 and 5 cells each and the cells of each of these tiles contain digits from 1 up to the number of cells in that tile with no digits being repeated. Thus a tile made up of 5 cells would contain one each of the digits 1 to 5. In addition, within the whole grid no two similar digits are adjacent horizontally, vertically or diagonally. Using the numbers already shown as clues the puzzle is to fill in all the cells of the box.



ABCx Puzzle


