


#### St. Oswald's Church - About us

# MOTHERS' UNION OCTOBER



For this meeting our speaker was our own Alan Restarick talking about his experiences as a Bee Keeper. When Alan retired about 5 years ago, he became interested in Bee Keeping and joined West Herts Bee Keeping Association and it has snowballed from there. He now mentors others who are interested. He has several hives in Croxley.

A typical hive has 1 Queen Bee, 2,000 Drones and 50,000 workers. The Queen Bee lays 1,000 eggs a day between March and September. The worker bees live for about six weeks and can fly up to three miles from the hive to flowers to collect nectar. Alan explained that there are many different shapes and styles of hives designed mainly by clergy or in Monasteries. He went on to explain various aspects of Bee Keeping and lots of fascinating facts, some illustrated by a power point and accompanying videos.

It was a fascinating afternoon and bees appear to be so intelligent and organised in their hives that we shall all respect the bees when we are enjoying eating their honey. Lots of questions were asked and the afternoon was enjoyed by all.

## MOTHERS' UNION NOVEMBER



For this meeting we welcomed Lynne, the founder of "Small Acts of Kindness". This Charity began 10 years ago after Lynne was without heating and hot water for a week during a very cold January. It was a very stark time, so Lynne started the Charity for the elderly – who may not have much money to balance between

heating and food. What happens when one gets cold, underlying illnesses can become worse, be less stable on one's feet and blood pressure can get higher to mention just a few issues.

The ideal temperature for the elderly is 22°C so the bags that are put together to provide a blanket, hats, gloves, and socks to keep the extremities warm and hot drinks to raise the core temperature. There is a pack of booklets where there is information that they may need called the Purple Pages (similar to the paper copy of Yellow Pages) rather than expecting the elderly to all cope with just digital access.

The first year 50 bags were put together on the kitchen table and they were taken to GPs, Churches, libraries, and meeting places that the elderly may visit. The second year volunteers helped to put together 200 to 1,000 bags. Feedback cards were included and proved how necessary the items were and how grateful the clients were that someone was thinking of them and helping them. Ten years later 1,500 bags will be distributed and they now cover Herts and Beds.

The Charity carried on throughout COVID and were awarded the highest honour for special recognition for the work through COVID – The Queens Award for Voluntary Service.

It was World Kindness Day today which was appropriate. Lynne thought there would come a time when these purple bags would not be needed but, if anything they are needed more than ever with the ever increasing fuel bills and food prices. We had donations and many items for Lynne to take away with her.

Many thanks Lynne it was a very informative talk and shows how small acts can develop and help so many people.

# PARISH NURSE MUSICAL MEMORIES AFTERNOON

The 14<sup>th</sup> November was the second Musical Memories Afternoon, organised by Croxley Parish Nursing team and it was such a gloomy wet afternoon outside with so much rain water laying on the surface. Inside the Baptist Church hall it was bright with the embroidered table cloths, colourful serviettes, and lovely flower decorations and all the smiles lit up the room, with the laughter and singing.



Over 50 people attended, which included people living with memory loss and dementia, and their carers. Cathy introduced the session with the order of the afternoon and various housekeeping information. The first choir the Watford Philharmonic Voices, sang songs from the "1930 Swing Era in the USA" which included "The

Continental" (a song featured in the film The Gay Divorcee, starring Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers), Somewhere over the Rainbow sung by Judy

Garland in the film The Wizard of Oz in 1939, and Glen Miller numbers. Then they did a medley of the Beatles songs and Bring me Sun Shine made famous by Morecambe and Wise which everyone happily joined in with.



This was followed by Afternoon Tea, a selection of delicious sandwiches and a variety of wonderful homemade cakes with a cuppa. This gave everyone a chance to have a chat. Many comments were made about how they really enjoyed the tea with the variety of sandwiches and cake.



Our last session was with Michael and the St. Oswald's Choir, with everyone having a song sheet they sang along to various songs including Old MacDonald, The Hills are Alive, and Beside the Seaside. Looking around the room, everyone was

singing along, clapping and swaying with the music, thoroughly enjoying themselves. One lady was imitating playing the piano and she had obviously been a very good player.

During the afternoon we were also fortunate to be joined by Ursula from the Association of Reflexology who is one of our Parish Nurse Volunteers, who offered gentle Hand Massages which help provide stress relief and promotes the body's own feelings bringing balance to the body. Many enjoyed the massage saying how relaxing it was.

There was much positive feedback, how enjoyable the afternoon had been with the music, singing and tea! Again, several asked, when is the next one? It was also commented by several couples how good it was to be able to go out somewhere together, rather than just sitting at home on their own. They enjoyed being in a safe place with such good company and entertainment, and thought the tea was delicious. One comment by a husband to his wife when they were ready to go home, as she held the bunch of flowers, was that she looked just like a bride and she gave such a lovely smile.

There are 1,000,000 people living with memory loss or dementia in the UK – though as yet there is no cure, music does seem to help. Songs can bring back treasured memories and provide powerful well-being benefits for people living with memory loss or dementia. This was proved this afternoon by the many smiles.



So I must now say a big thank you to everyone who helped make this event possible and run so smoothly: The Baptist Church for providing the venue, St. Oswald's Church for providing the music, The Methodist, St. Bedes and All Saints Churches for making the delicious spread, the washer-uppers, Sue Pope for putting together the flower posies, and all the volunteers who have contributed to making the afternoon so successful.

It is a privilege and our pleasure to organise such events which you all so obviously enjoyed. Here's to the next one!

Janet Staerck: Croxley Parish Nursing Volunteer

A footnote: Croxley has been one of five locations in Hertfordshire to pilot a new Accreditation Scheme for shops and organisations to become Dementia Friendly (and memory-loss supportive). Our Parish Nurse Cathy has lead on this, working closely with Memory Support Hertfordshire – local connection, information and advice for everyone affected by dementia and memory loss The Croxley Parish Nursing Service received funding from the Lottery Community Fund for one day a week over three years to develop dementia/memory loss initiatives

within the Croxley Green community.

This funding ends next year. There is still much to be done to enable a dementia friendly (and memory-loss supportive) community in Croxley. The Trustees hope to raise further funding to continue this work. For the last three years we have still made the cards for Bovingdon Prison. I have delivered them and have often emailed for information relating to the cards and there has been no response whatsoever! It has been decided that we will no longer provide them for the Prison, I have notified them and the response was less than satisfactory.

I have found a new outlet and the Mothers' Union Team at St. Albans are happy with this and the only change is we have to put a sticker on the back of the cards saying Made With Love by Mothers' Union St. Albans Diocese.

The first set of cards was given to the new recipients earlier this year, the DBA have replied with the following letter:

"Morning Janet, As you aware I'm the Training Development Manager & Lead Facilitator at the DBA Project. DBA stands for Dream; Believe: Achieve.

A humanistic person centred organisation that delivers Life Skill courses to individuals in their time of need, where they are rebuilding their lives and opportunities. The cards that you kindly donate to our organisation are distributed to our clients at organisations such as East of England Probation, DrugLink and various HMP establishments. They are a vital method of our participants staying connected with loved ones and rebuilding relationships with those close to them.

One of our participants through the card donations to Bovingdon Prison was able to maintain close family ties during his time in need. To this day he has on display one of the cards he received from The Mothers' Union Project, in his new abode. Intrinsically the card gave him hope and a sense of belonging and that people care. Please pass our appreciation to those involved with the cards. Kind Regards DBA Project Team"

Congratulations to all the prize winners.


There was also a very enjoyable supper prepared by Helen and Catherine McAlpine, assisted by Anne Thomas and Colin Nunn.



#### A CROXLEY RAMBLER'S DIARY: 18 JULY

#### 24th October 2025

The rain and wind of storm Benjamin had passed through the day before. In contrast, the day was pleasant sunshine, albeit with a cool northerly breeze. We made our way through the autumn tints of Cassiobury park to Watford Junction. London North Western have smartened their trains since my last trip, albeit some time ago. We alighted at Berkhamsted aiming to walk to Ashridge. Our route took us alongside the castle ruins and into the playing fields beyond, which are named after Field Marshal Kitchener. During the First World War this was a training camp for the Inns of Court Officer Training Corps and there are remains of training trenches nearby. Now it is home to cricket and bowls clubs.

The footpath took us through horse pastures at Wells Farm and into the woods of Berkhamsted common. The upward slope proved surprisingly testing to someone like me, clearly unfit. This is the place where local people successfully resisted the attempts by Lord Brownlow to enclose the common. On 6 March 1866 the Open Spaces Society organised a trainload of navvies to remove the illegal iron fences. The National Trust took ownership in 1926. The common today is a mixture of open space and woods, a favourite of dog walkers.




The strong sunshine highlighted the colours of bracken turning from gold to brown. There were fungi on the edge of the path - one with an egg-shaped cap which I subsequently discovered was a 'shaggy parasol'. Turning northwards we walked through the woods and into the Ashridge estate. At this time of year, on a bright day, the slanting rays of the sun create beautiful effects of shadow and colour. The white trunks of birch trees seemed almost luminous. This year the beech trees, turning bronze, have been particularly attractive and seem to be holding their leaves for longer.


We passed Coldharbour Farm and took the well-marked track to Woodyard cottages. On a previous visit in autumn I had been fortunate to see a herd of deer in the fields nearby but not this time. I'm sure there were plenty of deer around but lying low in the middle of the day. There were, however, some young cattle, some reddish brown and some almost pure white, taking their ease on the grass.

The path took us through a sweet chestnut grove in Thunderdell wood where the ground was covered in spiny cases and plenty of the shiny nuts. It has been an abundant year for them, as for other fruits and nuts. A passing walker drew our attention to a veteran beech tree which the National Trust has defended with a surrounding fence to keep people from trampling the roots. The tree has a World War 2 significance since American troops based at Ashridge before D-Day carved into the bark the names of eight US States plus the letter V for victory. One can only wonder what happened to them.


We emerged from the woods onto the Prince's Riding which connects Ashridge House with the tall monument to the 3rd Duke of Bridgewater, the 'father of inland navigation', who made his money from coal and canals. We turned towards the monument and the visitor centre where we enjoyed some coffee in the autumn sunshine.

From there it is a relatively short walk down the wooded slope into Aldbury where we arrived at the village Peace Memorial Institute, suitably decorated with poppies and union flags. Aldbury's duck pond and stocks are a magnet for photographers. The scene could almost be timeless but for the parked cars.





After an enjoyable lunch at the lately refurbished Trooper we called in on the church of St John the Baptist. The medieval building has Saxon origins and historical links to Missenden Abbey and the manors of Pendley and Ashridge. There are enough curiosities to keep someone like me interested in the church for a while. Those include a hairy 'wild man' on the tomb of Sir Robert Whittingham of Pendley, a church mouse in the colourful organ and a tablet to Sir James Craufurd who was churchwarden for 50 years until 1970! (I imagine he would have found someone else to do the work.)



The pleasant graveyard is still in use. A recent gravestone, decorated with images of a red kite and a rabbit, bears the legend "So Loved, So Loving, So Loud".

From the church it is a short walk to Tring station where we caught the train to Watford and, in deference to tired legs, found a bus home.

We expressed our thanks to Mark Saunders for the work he has done to improve the wireless microphones and noted the positive feedback from the congregation following removal of the rear pews.

The proposed display will need detailed design and approval from the Diocese. 




